






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PMF President receives New Year Honour

We are delighted to announce that our President, Jonathan Willcocks, was awarded a BEM in this year's New Year's Honours list for services to music.

'I am so delighted to receive this public honour. For singers of all ages to be able to come together to make music of high quality is a truly life-enhancing thing that brings so many new dimensions into their lives, said lonathan.

Other award winners with a connection to the Festival include Carolyn Samson, who sang for the Festival in 2000 as a rising star, and Kate Woolveridge (Joanna Kate Williams) who was engaged two years running to lead a vocal workshop in schools for the Michael Hurd Fund. The Fund is run by the Festival and gives awards to local young musicians to support them in their studies.

Mozart, Mass in C Minor

PMF is pleased to announce the return of Sofia Ticciati as the soprano soloist for Mozart's Mass in C Minor on Saturday 16th March. Sofia sang at the Festival in Dyson's The Canterbury Pilgrims in 2019. Clara Orif, who joined us last year at Jephtha, will take the role of second soprano. Another familiar singer will be George Curnow (Tenor) who has sung with the Petersfield Choir and SouthDowns Camerata, and Giles White (Baritone), music director of Rogate Choral Society.

Festival of Young Composers – 4th February

Come and see what the next generation of composers is up to! This year's Festival of Young Composers is taking place at 10am on 4th February at the Petersfield School and is open to the public. This will be the eighth competition, giving an ideal opportunity for imaginative musicians to share their creations with new audiences and receive expert feedback from a panel of judges.

Category A is open to young people aged 14 and under, and will this year feature Jude Gillham and William Sharps. The next age category, for composers aged 17 and under, will include Ava Groves and Joe Jolliffe (recorded performance) and William Hammond and Laurence Horwood (live performance). Refreshments are available, and the competition will finish at around 12.30pm following the presentation of awards and certificates of merit.

The Festival of Young Composers, which is run in association with the Michael Hurd Fund for Young Musicians, has so far given a platform to 48 young creatives since its inception in 2008. Their music is either played live or presented in recorded form to the public, and over £2,500 has been distributed in prize money to support the musical studies of the winners. Compositions have ranged from solo songs and piano music to a capella choral works, as well as a wide variety of instrumental ensembles.

All entries must be written for a maximum of twelve instruments or voices. Each year selected winning entries have been performed during the Petersfield Musical Festival Youth Concerts, a potential springboard into the wider world.

This year's Festival

Thoughts from conductor Paul Spicer

I am amazed to think that this year's Festival is my twentieth! How did that happen? But it must show that I enjoy coming to Petersfield and being with you all. I have always been grateful for the warmth of your welcome every time I come and that helps me to forget the usual road misery driving to you and back!

This year's Festival has two wonderfully different concerts, as we so often do. It is always a huge privilege to be able to direct a performance of Mozart's great C minor Mass, which was left tantalisingly unfinished at his death, like the Requiem. Also like the Requiem it is a work which has attracted a number of attempts at completion. In the case of the Mass the one by Robert Levin is really fine but is extremely challenging for the choir! But we are performing what Mozart left us and what we have is already quite challenging. Those singing it will undoubtedly scale those heights, and our first rehearsal last November showed the choir's enthusiasm for the work. I have always felt that if Mozart had finished the Mass, it would have stood alongside Bach's B minor Mass as one of the great choral edifices in the repertory. Like the Bach, the sheer scale of it is extraordinary, and we feel as if we are on an epic journey from those first 'weeping' phrases of the Kyrie which are so beautiful.

Accompanying this will be Mozart's evergreen Symphony No.40 in G minor, and I know that Southern Pro Musica will really enjoy giving this popular work a performance to balance and complement that of the Mass. It will be good to welcome them back again.

At the end of the Festival, we have a concert of English music by Elgar, Dyson, Ireland and Rutter. Elgar's beautiful Serenade for Strings starts the programme followed by Dyson's Hierusalem. I know that some of you have found this work difficult to get to grips with but I am hoping that I will be able to persuade you of its beauty over the coming weeks. In fact, I think the opening prelude for the orchestra is one of the loveliest pieces of string writing I know from this period. Dyson was locally connected, living in Winchester and being involved with this Festival for which he composed Agincourt which we performed a few years ago. Of course, when we planned this concert we didn't know that Jerusalem was going to be so centre stage in world news, and praying for the 'peace of Jerusalem' is very much needed at present.

After John Ireland's lovely Downland Suite for strings we end the concert with John Rutter's Magnificat — tuneful, joyful and entirely representative of Rutter's popular style. This doesn't mean that it, too, doesn't have its challenges, but they are entirely within reach of this choir! It should be a really lovely concert which everyone will enjoy on the night.

I very much look forward to rehearsing with you all.

In Memoriam

We remember fondly and gratefully former Festival committee members who have died recently

Simon Blumlein served on the Festival committee from 1993 to 2006 and ran the Festival box office from his CD shop in Dragon Street. He was the son of Alan Blumlein, the pioneering sound engineer who devised (among other inventions) the first stereo sound system. Simon was very active latterly in the belated recognition of his father's achievements. His wife, Anne, ran a popular dance school in Petersfield until she suffered a serious stroke, after which Simon gave up his shop to look after her. He was a well-known Petersfield personality and a great raconteur who loved to talk about his father's work and his school days at Dartington. He celebrated a milestone birthday by walking down Dragon Street on his hands!

Jackie Philipps was a leading member of the Festival committee from 1987 to 2004. She was minutes secretary from 1992 and the driving force behind the campaign for a Festival 'ambiance' that included the painted front panels and other cladding on the stage, and the foyer display. Jacquie was part of the Front of House team in the 2023 Festival, selling programmes. As well as the Festival, she was much involved in the town's musical theatre societies, latterly as president of Petersfield Theatre Group and DSM in their productions. She was a great friend of Michael Hurd and enjoyed retelling his (often risqué) jokes.
